It's Official - Nunnery has Best GCSE Results

WE are delighted to celebrate the hard work of students with an amazing set of GCSE results. We are especially proud that in the Department of Education's league tables, we are officially the best in Worcester and in the 'well above average' category, a category that includes the top 14% of schools in the whole country. Nunnery Wood's final ranking looks likely to be in the 89th percentile, therefore in the top 11% of schools nationally. There are two new accountability measures that are used, progress 8 and attainment 8 Progress 8 measures the amount of progress that students make from when they join the school to when they leave. Attainment 8 measures the average grade scores across 8 subjects including maths and English. Nunnery Wood is top of all Worcester schools in both of these new measures by a significant amount.

Progress 8 is well above average at 0.56 and attainment 8 is an impressive 53.9. To compare how we did against other schools, log on to www.compare-school-performance.service.gov.

New GCSE specifications that were designed to be much tougher, along with most subjects having no coursework and a grading system of 1-9 instead of A* - G, did not deter our students. They rose to the challenge and did themselves proud. A particular source of pride are the exceptional Maths and English grades where 75% of students gained a good pass or higher in both subjects. New specifications and tougher grade boundaries haven't stopped this being another success story for our students. An amazing 30% of grades in all subjects were at the highest

level – either a 7,8 or 9 (or A*/A). 133 passes were at Grade 9 or A*, these are only given for the most exceptional of performances. We also believe that we have one of the few students in the country to have attained grade 9s in all her subjects. Well done, Carla Shipley! Carla said that she 'Could not believe it as we did not know what to expect'. Callum Scoby said 'The hard work paid off, it was not easy but I am pleased with my results'. However, new accountability measures show that all our students, at all academic levels did superbly well and we are proud of them all.

The excellent results have given the students a boost at the start of the year and something to aspire towards themselves. However, there is so much more to life at Nunnery Wood than exam results. The new Year 7s have settled into their new school and routine and are loving their new school. There are clubs and activities on offer to all students every day of the week, with something to appeal to all interests. Not to mention the extensive trips and activities that are an integral part of school life. Already this term we have had theatre trips, geography field visits, dance trips, STEM and computing visits to name just a few! 

You may have seen the article in Worcester News celebrating the achievement of students across the city. I'm sure you share my pride that Nunnery Wood High is highest in Worcester for both Attainment 8 and Progress 8 – the two measures discussed in the article.

If anything captures the school's ethos, it's Progress 8. In crude terms, this measures shows where students started (KS2 SAT scores) and where they finished (GCSEs). It comes up with a number that shows how we perform compared to all other students nationally with the same starting point. Our score of +0.56 puts us in the top 11% of schools for adding value. In other words, no matter where they started, students made better progress with us than in almost

90% of other schools. Our score puts us in the highest government category since our progress is "Well above average".

Every student counts in this measure, no matter what challenges they face or talents they have, which is why I believe it shows our ethos is working. The phrase "An irresistible belief that every child can succeed" is something we refer to often in staff training and planning. This fantastic progress score shows that we are living out that belief. Our most academic students scored the new top grade, 9, with staggering frequency while others surpassed their own expectations and got the grades that will get them onto the right A level course or apprenticeship.

It's not possible to manufacture this kind of score from drilling students in Year 11 or being clever with examination entries. It can only come from strong pastoral systems, good transition from primary school and excellent teaching from Year 7 onwards. It comes from a school where all students buy in to our values and understand the opportunities that we offer. This is a school for everyone and we want everyone to thrive here.

Progress of this kind can only come also from a school in which parents are fully behind their child's education over 5 years. This parental support is a huge strength at Nunnery, which is why this year's examination results are something for the whole community to celebrate.

All New Fitness Suite!

DURING the summer holidays Nunnery Wood turned the old DA2 into a Fitness Suite. Now called FS1 the room houses five treadmills, a cross trainer, four fitness cycles, two state of the art step machines, free weights and a range of resistance machines. It is also fully air conditioned.

The main purpose of the facility is to offer another indoor area for the Physical Education department to use and introduce another activity on the curriculum for year 9, 10, and 11 students. However, the facility is open to all pupils in year 9 and above most lunch times and after school.

"It is a great facility to have on the school site" said Mr Bannister. "We have been fortunate to have had the use of the fitness room at the sports centre for the year 11 pupils for many years, but it was not always available when needed. Having our own facility means that fitness can now be a permanent fixture on the curriculum as well as an extra curricular activity. I would like to thank Mr Powell for finding the funding for the suite and remember it was

part of the very first conversation I had with him when he was appointed as head teacher at Nunnery Wood"

STEM: Next Generation Innovators Trip

ON Tuesday 9th October 2018, Year 9 enthusiastic STEM students went out to Malvern Festival of Innovation. A day showcasing creative science, technology, and entrepreneurship for senior school students. Students listened to a keynote speech delivered by Sonal Bhadane a leading innovator in radiation therapy from Clinical Oncology Solutions at Elekta Ltd.

Students also had the opportunity to take part in some engineering games such as using the power of the mind to move a ball, untangling themselves from a network of knots, trying to carry out a pipe endoscopy to crack a code or carry out an operation but only using their non-writing hand. Students also worked in pairs to programme mini computer boards to complete a hardware control task using Python code, see how many watts they could generate on a bicycle and were given the opportunity to explore galaxies through the Planetarium Dome, hearing about astrophysics from students at the

University of Birmingham's School of Physics and Astronomy.

Audrey Stuthers 9.3 said, "I really enjoyed meeting the RAF and experiencing some of the engineering challenges they face."

Lucie Tuberfield 9.2 said, "I especially enjoyed the planetarium dome, it was awe inspiring to put into perspective the size of our planet compared to the galaxy and universe."

Adjane Fortes 9.X said, I think the best part of the trip was learning about the hydrogen fuel cell cars can run simply on oxygen and hydrogen to produce water which is much more environmentally friendly to our planet."







What is STEM?

PERHAPS you have seen the term before, or maybe STEM is brand new to you. STEM is not new, but it is gaining a lot of attention in recent years. STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. STEM education is far more than just sticking those subject titles together; it is a philosophy of education that embraces teaching skills. Rarely does a job require only one skill set; jobs in the real world are interdisciplinary. Picture an architect; they use science, mathematics, engineering and technology to design complex buildings.

At Nunnery Wood High School, we want our students to develop diverse skills sets and have a passion for exploration and growth. Learn how to think critically, evaluate information, apply knowledge, research and skills to problem solve. STEM embraces these skills as well as the 4 Cs: Creativity, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, and Communication.

Therefore as of September 2018, Miss Lott will be taking on a new role responsible for developing STEM across the school.

STEM will not just be popping up in your lessons but also around the school and in different departments.

STEM: Creative Careers, Malvern Festival of Innovation

ON Friday 12th October 2018, eager Year 10 and 11 STEM students went out to Malvern College to listen about the opportunities available in STEM careers. The Year of Engineering is a UK government campaign which celebrates the world and wonder of engineering during 2018. From spaceships to ice skates, the bubbles in chocolate bars to life-saving cancer treatment, engineering touches every part of our lives. However, not enough young people think it's a world for them. As a result, the industry is struggling to recruit future talent. What's more, young people are missing out on the chance to make a positive difference to both their futures, that of the planet and everything that calls it home.

Miss Lott took out a selection of year 10 and 11 students interested in science, technology, engineering, and design to hear about applying for these subjects in the real world to hopefully inspire them to pursue an exciting career in the all-important creative economy.

From garage workshop to BBC's Dragons' Den, Worcestershire's inventor Pete Hill created novel product Pedaldish has just been featured on UK television, winning investment from Dragon's Den Deborah Meaden. With the prototype made in his garage, inventor Pete Hill talked about the core features of innovative product design, the challenges associated with taking risks, and some thoughts about making career decisions. He also explored how 3D printing is enabling budding inventors to design and redesign. Pete Hill invented the stainedglass bus shelter in 2008; a vandal resistant design which transforms bus shelters into works of art. He founded his own company Petvictus in 2016 to supply new products to the high street based on a range of homemade inventions he uses in his daily life. His inventions, "Pedaldish - The Lunchbox for Pets" and "Katfone - The Ultrasonic Whistle for Cats", won investment in BBC's Dragons' Den in 2018.

Students also had the opportunity to hear from Azam Din, Miles Deacon and Matthew Humphreys, mechanical engineering graduate employees of Jaguar Land Rover, as they explain what it is like to work for one of the UK's leading premium car manufacturers and how they help design the next generation of automotive vehicle. They drove to the venue in the new Jaguar I-PACE, an advanced electric SUV that has just been launched onto the UK

RGS Languages Trip

ON Friday 28th September Mrs Kendrick took 11 of our talented Year 11 linguists to RGS Worcester for a talk by Dr Charlie Louth who is a German and French lecturer at Oxford University. He talked a bit about his background learning and teaching French and German, then a bit more generally about language learning; tackling issues such as why he thinks languages are in decline in the UK and the pressures faced by students. He also spoke in a bit more detail about what studying a language at A-Level and at university is like. There were lots of students

from a range of schools in the county, many of whom are considering studying a language post-16. The group had the opportunity to sit and talk about A-Level studies with some current RGS students who explained what the course was like from a student's perspective. Nunnery students benefitted from the visit and are inspired to continue their language learning further – they'll certainly be in high demand by employers if they do!







EGX Exhibition Trip

ON Thursday 20th September the Computing Department took almost 90 pupils mainly from Year 10, to the EGX exhibition at the NEC in Birmingham. EGX is the UK's biggest computer games event and it gave Nunnery pupils the opportunity to get hands-on with big budget prerelease console and PC games as well as trying out the world's largest collection of indie titles and meeting and talking to their creators. On offer on the day was the possibility of get-

ting invaluable advice on working in the games industry which is now one of the biggest media industries in the world – far surpassing the turnover of the movie industry.

Many of the students talked to some of the leading UK Universities in the area of digital design and had the opportunity to pick up prospectuses from these Universities as well as talking to lead lecturers that may be teaching them in the future

Students had the opportunity to go to talks in the EGX theatres as well as attending panel presentations from prominent game designers. On the day many new games were launched at this exhibition including the likes of Assassin's Creed, Call of Duty, and Kingdom Hearts. Our students had the opportunity to spend some time trying out new games and hardware to gain an insight into the multimedia possibilities that they could be involved in should they wish to

pursue a career in the gaming industry be that digital arts, sound recording and editing, animation or coding.

The day was a great success with Nunnery students being impeccably behaved and a credit to themselves and the school. Needless to say the Department will be running this trip again next Year for those that have

Iceland Exploration

MARKUS Telger visited Iceland with his scout group. Here he explains to us what the trip involved.

"I can see why Iceland is on everyone's bucket list. When I got the opportunity to go on tour to Iceland with my scout group, I jumped at the chance. After saving up for 2 years and doing extra fund raising events, July 31st came round. Departing from Worcester on route to Manchester at 5am in the morning was not fun, but this was just the start of my adventures.

Landing in Reykjavik at 4pm in the pouring rain, I knew that me week could be wet and cold, but on the whole we only had one wet day, but waterproofs on and off we went.

We stayed at a scout site in the south, about an hour from the capital city. This was a super base for our tour.

On the first day we did a 16 mile hike in the stunning countryside. Breath-taking is an understatement. We were even allowed to drink water from the fresh streams. We ended our hike with a swim in one of the thermal streams, just what we needed.

Day 2 saw us kayak across the second coldest lake in Iceland, no room for error here! When we reached our destination, off with the paddles and on with the climbing gear, up a mountain into a cave. Well worth the climb across a mountain face to see the stunning views. Day 3 brought with it tourist adventures. We started off by coach to the Secret Lagoon, thermal spa. This was awesome, even if it did small of sulphur. After an hour, we travelled onto Gulfoss, one of the biggest waterfalls in Iceland. We also took in the Geyser site and watched it rise and explode. After that we travelled to where the tectonic plates of Europe and North America are slowly drifting apart.

The next day was very wet – as a scout when we visit another location, we must do a service to the community. We were asked by the site manager to replant birch trees from the forest to the campsite. Even in pouring rain, this job was fun, especially followed by hot chocolate and biscuits.

We borrowed microscopes from the Science Department and used them to help us draw the tiny creatures and plant life that were present in the water.



Mazak Apprenticeship



SUMMER Stedman who left Nunnery Wood this year is now undertaking an apprenticeship with Mazak, a large international engineering company. Summer told us how she is getting along and offers her advice if you are considering this career path.

Can you explain a little bit about what an apprenticeship is and why it interested you?

An apprenticeship is where a company trains you at the same time as you are earning money.

The idea is that they will employ you when you have completed the apprenticeship. If you work hard and get on well you have a good chance of this happening.

It interested me because it allows me to learn from within the company and have a good chance of a job at the end of it. You get to learn and get qualifications whilst getting paid. This means useful and recognised qualifications and no debt like you may get by going to university.

How many apprenticeships did you apply for?

I only applied for one apprenticeship through Worcester Group Training Association, but through them I was chosen by two big companies, Mazak and Amada. I chose Mazak because I had heard more about it and it offered me a career path that I wanted. I will have lots of career and travel opportunities with Mazak.

Was there an interview process and if so, what was it like?

The interview process was quite long, altogether I had 5 interviews, 2 practical assessments and 2 tests. I had the practical tests and assessments for both companies that I was applying to. At the time this was stressful because it was at the same time as my final mock exams and was approaching the start of my final GCSEs.

What have your first few days and weeks been like?

My first week involved a lot of administration and paperwork, but now all of the trainees are getting into it. We have 3 sessions of 1 hour and

45 minutes with a 30 minute lunch break. The lecturers are really kind and supportive.

What qualifications did you need to do the apprenticeship?

I needed to achieve 4 grade C GCSEs or equivalent to be eligible to apply.

Which subjects at school would help to get on an apprenticeship?

If you want a career in engineering would suggest that you take subjects like DT or computing. I also suggest taking a subject that you really enjoy and find relaxing. You need to get core subjects such as maths and English too.

What advice would you give to Year 11s starting their final year at school?

I have already given advice to some current year 11s and would encourage all of them to study hard, ask questions, stay and ask for help when you need it to make sure you understand, avoid drama but make sure you make time for a social life so you have a good work / life balance.

Is there anything else you would like to add? I would definitely say that there need to be more women in engineering! Out of 64 trainees only 4 are girls. It is not a stereotypically dirty boys' job, it is more about problem solving and is practical. If you enjoy being more practical than academic then this could definitely be the route for you. Mazak looks after apprentices very well and do all they can to help. It is a good way to earn money and learn at the same time.

Halloween cupcakes



Ingredients

100g butter, cubed 100g plain chocolate 100g golden caster sugar 1 egg ½ tsp vanilla extract 125g self-raising flour 250g white fondant icing 500g mixed pack coloured fondant

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3. Line a 12-hole cupcake tin with paper cases. Gently melt the butter, chocolate, sugar and 100ml hot water together in a large saucepan, stirring occasionally. Set aside to cool a little.
- 2. Stir the egg and vanilla into the chocolate mixture. Put the flour in a large mixing bowl, then add the chocolate mixture and stir until smooth. Divide the mixture evenly between the paper cases; they should be about three-quarters full. Bake on a low shelf in the oven for 20-22 mins. Press on the cupcakes to check if they're cooked; the tops should spring back. Remove from the oven and leave to cool.
- 3. Use the image above as a guide to decorating the cupcakes. Packet fondant can often be quite sticky; if yours is, pat walnut-sized lumps of fondant over the surface of each cake, rather than trying to roll it all out. Knead yellow and red fondant together to make orange icing. Make extra decorations, like hair and mouths, out of fondant and stick them on using a little water. Use the icing pens to draw lines in the fondant. Add icing eyes wherever you like.




National Fitness Day





















SMSC Day





Changes to Assessment and Reporting

WE have made some changes to the way we structure student reports.

The key change that we have made for 2018/19 affects teacher judgements for classwork, homework and behaviour in lessons.

The information below summarises our reporting system.

More details can also be found in the 'Curriculum' section of the school website.

Reporting information to Parents and Students

Parents / carers and students will receive reports that summarise information relating to progress. attendance and behaviour approximately 3 times per year. The information that will be included in each report is slightly different for students in key stage 3 and 4. Each report will be provided in a printed format and in a digital format on the school portal.

KS3 reports (years 7, 8 & 9)

Information that will be included in reports include

Overall

- Attendance % to date
- Number of lates to date

KS3 Subject specific

For each subject there will be ...

- A teacher judgment of the 'current working at' grade that the student is performing at on the new grade scale
- A separate teacher judgement of student effort with classwork and homework on a 1-5 scale. See appendix table 2
- A teacher judgement of student behaviour on a
- 1-5 scale. See appendix table 2
- A teacher judgement of the progress being made by the student. See appendix table 3
- A 'next step in learning comment' from the teacher that provide a focus for the key subject specific priorities that need addressing (twice per year)

The 'working at' grade will have three different ratings (sub grading's)

- + Mastered (securely working at grade, very few areas of weakness)
- = Securing (working well at grade level with a few significant weaknesses)
- Developing (starting to work at target level but with a range of weaknesses or gaps in knowl-

In year 9 for English, maths and science the teacher judgement of the current 'working at grade' will be replaced with a banded 'teacher estimate to the end of KS4'. This will provide an indication of the grade that the teacher thinks the student may achieve at the end of the GCSE based upon current indicators.

The 'estimated GCSE grade' will have three different ratings (sub grading's)

- + secure grade- hopefully guaranteed of the grade, could potentially achieve the grade above
- = insecure grade intervention required to secure grade or boost to the next grade
- very insecure grade a high level of intervention is required, the student is as likely to achieve the grade below

Reporting information to Parents and Students – Form reports

In addition to the subject reports described above parents/carers will also receive a report that is written by the students' form tutor once per academic year. The published date for the full report varies for each year group but does

Personalised Target Grades (PTGs)

AT Nunnery Wood High School we are always striving to find new ways to raise the levels of attainment and achievement for students. Several years ago, we introduced a system of sharing KS4 target grades and the percentage target chances (PTCs) with students. Over the next few weeks our current Year 10 students will be receiving their KS4 target grades and the associated percentage chances. We will be providing them with the opportunity to discuss the information with their form tutors and subject

A time line for the sharing of this information is shown below.

Year 10 Sharing of information

• Week Beginning 5th November 2018 - SLT presentation to year 10 students regarding PTCs during an assembly

- Monday 12th November During am form time, form tutors distribute letters and reiterate the theory and process of PTCs to students; students stick one version of their PTC chances grid into their planner.
- Monday 12th November Friday 23rd November- Teachers allocate time from 1 lesson to a subject specific discussion regarding PTCs; students record any key information in their planner on their PTC grid.

The process of using Personalised Target Chances (PTCs)

The table below shows a target grade and the probability of achieving each individual GCSE grade 1-9 for one KS4 subject course for one student. The probabilities are based upon each student's own educational background and

coincide with year specific priorities. For example if may occur just after mocks for students in year 11 or during our options process for students in year 9.

Showing targets as probabilities rather than as single target grades allows us to see the whole range of grades that similar students, with similar backgrounds and KS2 performance, have achieved in the past. This table of information allows us to see that although, as a school, we have set challenging targets for students in KS4 subjects, it is possible for them to achieve even better grades. As a school we passionately believe in setting challenging, and aspirational targets; and that sharing the percentage chance probabilities is empowering for the student and

helps us to support them either further.

A 25% probability of achieving a grade 6 grade in Maths reminds us that in previous years 1 in 4 similar students did actually achieve this grade. The 21% in the grade 7 box indicates that the student has a very good chance of achieving a higher grade if they apply themselves fully during their KS4 studies.


