
2019 - We Are Ready!



AS 2018 draws to an end, we take a look back at all that the year has brought to Nunnery Wood. Despite the school year ending in July, we still like to celebrate the end of one year and the start of a new one. The year has brought some big changes to the school, a huge investment of money has improved the site and facilities, a particular highlight is the brand new fitness suite with its state of the art equipment, as well as new classrooms, covered walkways and new outdoor social spaces and equipment. Harrison Dolby, Year 9 said: "We are at that age now where fitness is so important, so we

are very lucky to have these facilities. The gym offers a range of exercises for us to take part in, including cardiovascular activities and weights."

In addition to this we have seen the introduction of our new rewards and awards policy being rolled out to all year groups, which is proving to be a huge success and students are loving tracking their merits and badges. 2018 also delivered amazing GCSE results, placing us in the top 14% of schools in the country for the amount of progress that students at Nunnery Wood make. This is something that we are especially proud



We are delighted that currently we are the most successful in taking students to their next destination in life. As we said goodbye to the class of 2018, we welcomed the new Year 7 intake, which includes an addition form, making it the first 11 form year group. They have settled in well and are all thriving and enjoying life at Nunnery Wood. We were also lucky to welcome some new and exceptionally talented new staff to join the team. Throughout this year STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) has been hugely transformed in school, with it now being a key part of life at Nunnery. There have been several trips and clubs to promote this as well as numerous displays in school. In addition to academic success, students have had an enormous number of opportunities to get involved in clubs, trips and activities. These have included overseas trips to Disneyland, Skiiing, Berlin, Sorrento, the battlefields of France and Belgium and Spain as well as trips to a range of places including London museums, theatre trips, field visits to support the curriculum as well as a whole range of visits to other local schools, colleges and businesses to support learning and provide additional opportunities. Every day there are clubs in school at lunchtime and after

school, there is always something for everybody from computing club to sports clubs, science and DT clubs as well as singing, dancing, music, drama, film, reading and homework clubs! Some of the other highlights of the year have been the performances put on. The summer shows ended the academic year with performances of singing, dancing and drama, more recently we have delivered the Remembrance evening that included dance and musical performances as well as an exhibition of artwork. Key Stage Three students have each had their own muic evening to showcase their talents in an infomal environment. The final part of the year is always busy with singers perfoming at the Worcester Victorian Fayre, actors treading the board at the Alexander Theatre in Redditch to perform in the Shakespeare Schools Festival, and the year ended with the Shakespeare and Song production that included acting, singing and dancing, the Carol Concert and performances in all of the end of year assemblies. The sporting success of the school goes from strength to strength with a wide range of teams regularly training and competing in local and national matches and tournaments, including the under 14 football team reaching the 4th round of the National Cup.

Farewell to 2018, we are ready for 2019 and all of the opportunities and successes that we are certain it will bring!

New Connections

The Autumn Term is always a long and busy one. As ever, our fantastic students have been active both in and out of the classroom and you'll get a sense of the immense variety of sports, arts and STEM events that have taken place by reading this edition of the Nunnery News

One highlight was the Remembrance Event in November, organised by Ms Speechley, that brought together superb readings, dance and drama to create a poignant reflection on conflict and loss.

The evening was made more memorable by the presence of Luke Perry who is now linked to the school in an unlikely way. Prior to taking a group a Nunnery group on a battlefields trip, Mr Bannister found a memorial cross lying in a Worcester reclamation yard. Realising that it was probably intended for a memorial

somewhere, he took it with him to Tyne Cot in Belgium and placed next to the name of the soldier named. It was there that Luke Perry found the cross since, by strange coincidence, he had travelled to see the memorial shortly after Nunnery Wood students. He was the one who had created the cross in memory of a family member and was astonished at the journey it had made. It was only when he saw a newspaper article shortly after this that he got in touch with the school.

Luke kindly agreed to tell the story of this cross – and the experience of his relatives in the Great War- at the Remembrance Event. It was a powerful and touching moment. He has since donated a book on the war to the school, cementing an unusual but powerful link that we hope to maintain.

Ongoing investment

Around the school, improvements are continuing: covered walkways and new routes around the school are now complete with work due to begin on new car-parking and drop off areas at the front of the school in February. Also at this time, we will begin the million-pound transformation of the Art teaching area. This will bring to a conclusion the £2.2 million investment that is making the school an ever more student-friendly environment.

The Rewards System at Nunnery Wood High School

NUNNERY Wood aims to encourage and celebrate the success of all its students in all areas of school life, and to ensure that personal commitment and achievement is celebrated and rewarded.

Since its launch with Year 7 students in April 2018, we have used an online platform called ePraise to award merit points and achievement badges for students. This has been trialed with Year 7 students and due to its overwhelming success has been rolled out to all other year groups since September 2018. Merits are awarded in subject areas for 'commendable effort within the subject where students have gone above and beyond our expectations'. Commendable effort can be recognised in lessons and also out of lessons. Students also receive a weekly point for 100% attendance for the week.

Teachers can also award achievement badges

on ePraise to students for contributing in a particular event/activity. Students can collect these badges throughout the year and will form evidence to support coloured tie applications.

This platform can be accessed by students through their portal page so that they can track the points and achievement badges that have been awarded to them by different teachers across the curriculum. Student's progress can also be accessed through the parental portal so that parents/carers can track from home how their son/daughter is progressing.

As students collect awards badges they achieve milestone awards, bronze, silver and gold. Several students have begun to achieve these milestone certificates.
















Community and Charity Notice Board






No Regrets for New Hair

Nunnery Wood's Remembrance Evening

THIS year marks the 100th centenary for the end of the first World War. World War One began on the 28th July 1914 and involved major countries such as Germany, France, Belgium, United States, Russia, Italy and the United Kingdom. The war lasted a horrific 4 years, despite the belief that the war would be over by Christmas of 1914, on the 11th November 1918 Germany signed an armistice prepared by Britain and France which drew the First World War to an end.

However, as we all know this wasn't the war to end all wars. Since then major wars have included World War 2, Korean War, Vietnam War, Falkland War, Afghanistan War and Iraq War each bringing terror and destruction in its path. Since the end of the First World War, the 11th November has been a day or remembrance for anyone who has been involved in conflict of any kind.

To mark 100 years since the end of the First World War Nunnery Wood took part in a Remembrance evening to remember the fallen during one of the most tragic conflicts that has taken place in the last 100 years.

Featuring contributions from all across the school this solemn evening was one of many that took place across the country. Outside the studio there were hundreds of red, white, gold and silver poppies hanging from the ceiling that the Year 7 DT club created. As well as that students of all years volunteered to create fantastic pieces of artwork that were displayed everywhere around the studio.

The evening itself featured speakers who told the stories of the men in the trenches as well as many women children and older people who played a huge part in both raising morale at home or at the front line. Many others spoke about the importance of remembrance to them and how they had been affected by war. There was also the heart-warming tale of how PE's very own Mr Bannister found a remembrance cross near a tip in Worcester that was inscribed with the name of a soldier killed in action and whose grave was in one of the European battlefields. From here Mr Bannister organised a trip to the battlefields so they could put the cross on the soldiers grave.

Miss Speechley who ran the event said "World

War One has impacted the lives of all of us in one way or another and we wanted to give students the chance to acknowledge the sacrifices made. It is also an opportunity for students to understand the effects of subsequent wars and to pay tribute in a way that they feel appropriate. "So many of the students brought in photos, artefacts and stories of relatives involved in the conflict. Our students showed genuine enthusiasm and interest in learning more about World War One and remembrance, it has proven that the issues are still significant to the younger generation. The students wanted to express their thanks to those who gave their lives or survived the horrors of the conflict despite the fact that it

had slipped from living memory."

The evening was packed full of dance and music exhibitions from local groups and students themselves and was a fitting tribute to the soldiers who lost their lives in order so we could live ours in peace.

On behalf of everyone who visited the event I would like to thank you for your support and dedication at this special time of year and hope you can visit events in the future.

Nunnery Chooses Respect!

NUNNERY Wood joined other schools and colleagues around the country in promoting antibullying week. The national focus for anti-bullying week this year has been 'choose respect over bullying'. Nationally students have been encouraged to think about how their behaviour can set a positive example for others and the importance of choosing to treat each other with respect at school, at home, in the wider community and online. In particular the idea of respectfully disagreeing with others has been a key point covered. Students across all year groups at Nunnery wood have had this message echoed through assemblies which have reiterated the schools code and core values; be respectful, be cooperative, be responsible. Students have also taken part in a range of anti-bullying activities during morning registration.

Following a consultation with over 800 children, teachers and members of the Anti-Bullying Alliance, it emerged that a top priority was showing that bullying is a behaviour choice, and that children and young people can set a positive example by opting to respect each other at school, in their homes and communities, and online.

The aims of the week were to help children and young people, school staff and parents to understand:

The definition of respect
That bullying is a behaviour choice

That we can respectfully disagree with each other i.e. We don't have to be best friends or always agree with each other but we do have to respect each other.

That we all need to choose to respect each other both face to face and online.

In groups, the animation students began by developing a narrative for their animated 'river story'. Many groups choose to look at the impact rubbish and plastics are having on the natural environment. The students then, with the help of 3rd Year University students and their lecturer, drew, cut and/or coloured their background scenes, characters and props.


Once this was all ready, the students got the opportunity to use the latest stop-motion anima-

tion equipment to film their short animation piece. Lots of fantastic results were achieved by the end of the sessions.

The students then walked to The Hive to have a spot of lunch and to look at the current Rivers of the World exhibition and were very excited to see work that was produced last term by some Year 9 Nunnery Wood students! After a short explore of the rest of The Hive, it was back to school for 3.05pm.

It's safe to say that all the students got a lot from the day and many are inspired to create their own stop-motion animations or even study it further! The students represented the school brilliantly.











Costumes and Sets by GCSE Dancers

YEAR 10 GCSE dance students took part in a competition to recreate the best example of the set design from Christopher Bruce's dance work 'Shadows'. The students have been studying this as part of their dance GCSE which include both practical and academic exams. Christopher Bruce's works are often 'politically aware', in reference to past or current political events happening across the world, exploring their effect on human life. In this piece, Bruce invites the audience into the world of a small family, possibly set in Eastern Europe (though this is left up to individual interpretation) coming to

terms with deprivation, poverty, and the realities of what lies outside their intimate family home. Bruce describes this piece as "a darker work, with a sort-of narrative", allowing the audience to apply their own context to the material danced on stage. He started 'Shadows' with the idea of a family unit sitting around the hearth or around a dinner table and knew that the furniture would become an intrinsic part of the choreography as opposed to being a static set. The "anxiety of the music" greatly influenced the movement content, with the form of the piece allowing each member of the family to

have a voice and tell their story. Christopher Bruce was awarded many accolades, including an Honorary Life Membership of Amnesty International in recognition of his achievements in the field of dance and human rights.

In a previous dance lessons, students produced costumes from the dance work 'A Linha Curva'. A Linha Curva means The Curved Line in Portuguese. The stimulus for the work is Brazilian culture. Galili, the choreographer, wanted to create a celebration the Brazilian way of life and the ability to live in the moment. The piece

is intended to be fun. Large ensemble sections of vibrant Brazilian inspired movement are performed in regimental straight lines, creating a sense of samba parade. There are also a number of narrative sections that through the choreography present observations of how Brazilian men communicate with women, for example men in tribes hunting the girls as well as showing off and competing with each other.





Shakespeare Schools Festival

If you want to be part of the next performance watch out as at the end of the school year rehearsal will be starting up again for the next Shakespeare blockbuster and there are always different dance performances going on."







Year 7 Musicians Take to the Stage

YEAR 7 musicians took part in an informal concert in The Studio. Students of all abilities took part, from those who were more experienced musicians to some who had only started lessons this term. The evening was an informal setting 'café-style' to allow pupils a friendly setting for their first concert here and all the pupils performed brilliantly. Mr Poll, who organised and hosted the evening, said, "The evening was thoroughly enjoyed by all who participated and attended. Well done to Year 7 students who took part, they all did incredibly well."



Reach for the Stars - Year 9 Meet Astronaut!

YEAR 9 students had an incredible opportunity to meet Captain Winston Scott, a retired astronaut when he visited Worcester recently. Amongst his achievements Captain Scott has carried out several missions to space and a has logged a total of 24 days, 14 hours and 34 minutes in space, including 3 spacewalks totalling 19 hours and 26 minutes. He was part of the team of astronauts sent to space in two very famous and televised missions: Endeavour and Columbia missions to space. In fact he is that famous that when you google an astronaut's image often his is the first to be seen!

Mr Annis, who organised the trip, said "The students and I really enjoyed hearing about his amazing experiences in space as well as becoming a lot more familiar with what it is like to live in space. For example I had never considered how fast they orbit the Earth – so much so that they experience 16 sunrises in 24 hrs! Linked to this how quickly temperatures can change in space! Whilst in space the astronauts would be met by brilliant bright light and intense temperatures for 45 minutes before switching to pitch black, freezing conditions for the next 45 minutes. So much so that underneath their space suits astronauts have to wear a water suit to help them regulate their own temperature without which they would die!"

Captain Scott always described the fun that they would have in space; holding their own version of the Olympics by creating events such as spinning astronauts with different nationalities competing against each other. As well as all the fun they had floating around and how they swallowed water globules that would float around the cabin which they were able to push a straw into and drink. He explained that Capri Sun style drinks containers were designed for the first time for them to use in space before the design was then sold and used commercially.

Even his accounts of how they would go to the toilet were both fascinating and amusing as Captain Scott described the vacuum cleaner style toilet that they would have to strapped onto as they sat on it to stop them floating off whilst going to the toilet and the fact that they brought all of their waste back to Earth where scientists then studied their waste hoping to learn how zero gravity affects digestion! The visit was an incredible opportunity and insight into something really different and inspiring. Captain Scott had not come from a privileged background and as a black man in America at the time achieved huge amounts, mainly through hard work, dedication and the desire to continually push himself to try new things.

Lola Brothwell attended the visit and said "I thought the trip was very exciting and I think that it is a moment I will never forget, Captain Scott was a very nice person and I hope he will continue to inspire young people all over the world for a long time in the future."





Bringing a Boost of 'MonsterConfidence' to Girls

THIRTEEN Year 10 and Year 11 girls attended the annual STEMettes' Monster Confidence conference in Birmingham on 6th November

The conference ran by STEMettes' works to inspire, encourage and support young women into STEM careers (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths). STEMettes' recognise the lack of diversity in STEM roles, with only 21% of those working in STEM-related roles across the UK being women; only 7% of engineers are women and 17% of those working in technology are women. Nunnery Takes on Warriors

MR Bannister, PE teacher, has been working with Worcester Warriors Rugby Club to provide opportunities for students to progress further in rugby. Alongside teaching PE at Nunnery Wood, Mr Bannister has been a rugby selector, coach and team manager at county, divisional and national levels in both under 16 and under 18 age groups for more than 25 years. He wanted to improve opportunities for non fee paying schools in rugby and so has been working with the club.

In the first meeting with the rugby club there was an elephant in the room which was the poor community relationships that Worcester Warriors have had with certain types of schools," said Mr Bannister. "Obviously they have got good links with RGS (Royal Grammar School Worcester), King's (School Worcester), Malvern College and Bromsgrove School. But there have

never been really strong, established links with schools that don't play a lot of rugby. That accounts for probably 90 per cent of the children that go to school in Worcestershire. Teachers and rugby coaches from 50 schools were invited to Warriors' last home game against Harlequins and Worcester's owners distributed free tickets to 1,600 schoolchildren for European Challenge Cup clash with Pau at Sixways. Students had the opportunity to play on the pitch during half time of the main match.

Mr Bannister continued to say, "The plan is to engage with all the schools in that area and that's over 1,300 schools. It's a long process but it is a process that I consider myself extremely honoured to be involved in. It's all about offering children the opportunity to be able to have a lifestyle that involves playing rugby at whatever level."







Year 7 – electronic 'Jitterbug' Students have been studying research material to help them generate a variety of ideas for an electronic bug that they will create.









Pursuing a Career in Medicine



Movie - The Hate U Give

The Hate U Give is about Starr Carter (played by Amandla Sternberg who you might know from playing Rue in The Hunger Games) and follows her switching between her two worlds: the poor ,predominantly black neighbourhood she lives in, Garden Heights and the rich, predominately white world of the private school that she attends, Williamson Prep.

From watching the trailer we see that the border of these two worlds is destroyed when she witnesses the shooting of her friend Khalil by a white police officer. In the trailer we see Starr and Khalil in Khalil's car driving through Garden Heights and listening to music- this seems pretty normal for two teenagers but that's when the normality stops. They are flagged down by a police car and Khalil is asked to get out of the car with his hands on the roof of the car, when the police officers step back to their car he moves, looks through the window and asks Starr if she is okay. Worried, she tells Khalil to go back to where the police officer told him to stand Khalil reaches through the window

to grab a brush from the seat of his car and is instantly shot.

The phrase "it's the same story just a different name "is used in the trailer and it really made me think more deeply into cases of unnecessary police brutality. What I think is important to realise about The Hate U Give is that the film is not anti-police but anti-police brutality. From April to June 2017 force from handcuffs to guns was used 12600 times. The statistics showed that a disproportionate amount of these events were targeted at people of Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic backgrounds, in particular 87% of these incident were targeted at men, 36% percent of these incidents were targeted at Black people and 10% were targeted at Asians. Figures like these show how there is a conscious and unconscious bias towards BAME people, particularly men. There has been a 79% increase in brutality rates this year which averaged at 1890 examples of police brutality a week. In London black people make up 13% of the capitals population but they are involved in

39% of cases where police brutality occurs.

These figures speak for themselves, to conclude I would hope that this article made you understand the importance of films and other pieces in the media that spread messages like these and make you realise stereotypes and biases that you place on people of BAME backgrounds.

Raspberry Swiss Roll



Carys Slimming **YEAR 7**

Why not make this easy to follow recipe and enjoy with friends over the festive period?

Ingredients:

- 4 free range eggs
- 115g/4oz caster sugar, plus extra to dust
- 1 vanilla pod; seeds only
- 75g/3oz self-raising flour
- 200ml/7foz double cream
- 1tsp vanilla extract
- 200g/7oz raspberries

For the raspberry jam

- 150g/5 and a half oz caster sugar
- Half a lemon, zest and juice
- 350/ 12oz raspberries

How to

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C/170C Fan/Gas 5 and line a 23x33cm/9x13in Swiss roll tin with baking paper.
- 2. Place the eggs, sugar and vanilla seeds into a bowl and whisk until very pale, fluffy and thickened.
- 3. Sift in the flour and carefully fold in. Pour into the lined tin and smooth with a spatula until evenly spread. Bake for 10–12 minutes, or until just firm to the touch.
- 4. Place a sheet of baking paper, slightly bigger than the tray, onto a work surface and dust with caster sugar. Turn the sponge out onto the paper, peel off the baking paper on the bottom of the sponge and set aside to cool a little.
- 5. Pour the double cream and vanilla extract into a large bowl and whip to soft peaks.
- 6. For the raspberry jam, heat a frying pan until hot. Add the sugar, lemon zest and juice and cook for 3–4 minutes until the sugar has dissolved. Mix in the raspberries and cook for 3–5 minutes until thick. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool.
- 7. Spread the jam over the sponge, leaving a 2cm/1in gap around the edge. Spread the whipped cream over the top, leaving the edges, then sprinkle over the whole raspberries.

 8. Take the longest edge of the sponge and using the baking paper underneath, roll up the sponge quite tightly, making sure the filling stays inside. Roll the sponge off the parchment, dust with extra caster sugar and cut into slices

YEAR 10 students have been getting to grips with the difficult task of making choux pastry. Choux pastry is the lightest, crispiest, airiest pastry, which can be used to make profiteroles, éclairs or savoury gougères. It puffs up in the oven until it is eventually set by the heat. The airiness is caused because choux has a high water content, which is turned into steam during baking and this forces the pastry shell outwards and gives it volume.























Gingerbread Men Recipe



The perfect recipe for Christmas.

Ingredients

- 175g brown sugar
- 85g golden syrup
- 100g butter
- 350g plain flour, plus extra for dusting
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 1 tbsp ground ginger
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 egg

Method

- 1. Melt the sugar, golden syrup and butter in a saucepan, then bubble for 1-2 mins. Leave to cool for 10 mins.
- 2. Tip the flour, bicarbonate of soda and spices into a large bowl. Add the warm syrup mixture and the egg, stir everything together, then gently knead in the bowl until smooth and streak-free. The dough will firm up once cooled. Wrap in cling film and put in fridge for at least 30 mins.
- 3. Remove the dough from the fridge, leave at room temperature until softened. Heat oven to 180c fan / gas mark 6 and line two baking trays with baking paper.
- 4. Roll out the dough to the thickness of 1cm, then cut out gingerbread men with a cutter. Reroll the excess dough and keep cutting until it's all used up.
- 5. Lift the biscuits onto the trays and bake for 10-12 mins, swapping the trays over halfway through cooking. Leave to cool on the trays for 5 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Leave to dry for 1-2 hrs.
