


Preparing For Life!

SMSC Day (Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural education) took place on 24th January and provided students with an opportunity to learn about skills and topics that will be invaluable in their future life and decision making.

Each year group had a different focus. Year 7 and 8 students focussed on Multicultural Britain, anti-bullying, consent and social media and living in Britain today. Years 9 to 11 tackled jobs and careers. The day included a whole range of outside guests and speakers coming in to work with students and give professional advice and guidance. Local magistrates delivered a talk on criminal responsibility and two representatives from Amnesty International, who also run a charity called Malvern Welcomes, that helps to look after local refugees, gave a talk about what asylum seekers are and why people might be forced to leave their country. Students explored what they might do and how they might feel if they were in the situations faced by refu-

gees and were introduced to some children's books telling the story of young people forced to leave their homeland. Musical activities helped students to understand what is meant by British values and how these are incorporated into school and wider society. To offer careers advice and support, representatives from over 40 local businesses came in to school to deliver mock interviews and offer guidance on career choices. The careers fayre that formed part of the day was bigger and better than ever and saw the main hall packed out with students wanting to get information. Further education institutes gave talks throughout the day covering information on apprenticeships, A Levels and diplomas. Mr Steward said: "The day was really successful, with a great buzz. Students gained access to wealth of information about their options and choices for the future."

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

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
Worcester Teen Book Award





LIBRARY Club are once again taking part in one of the most successful British writing competitions; Radio 2's 500 Words short story competition. It is open to children aged between 5-13. Since the competition was launched 7 years ago nearly half a million children have written stories; that's over 277 million words! In 2016, 123,436 children entered the competition!

All you have to do is submit a story that has 500 words or less. If you win, your story could be read live on Radio 2 by a superstar celebrity like Julie Walters, Tom Hiddleston, Sir Kenneth Branagh, Jeremy Irons or Benedict Cumberbatch. Each year, 10 million Radio 2 listeners hear, read and love these stories. This year the final will be hosted by Chris Evans from the Tower of London and promises another all-star cast of celebrity guests.

The panel of judges deciding the winners in each category are Malorie Blackman, Frank Cottrell Boyce, Francesca Simon, Charlie Higson and the honorary judge, Her Royal Highness, The Duchess of Cornwall. As well as rubbing shoulders with the stars there are great prizes to be won. Bronze winners win their height in books, Silver winners win the Duchess of Cornwall's height in book and the Gold winners win Chris Evans height in books as well as 500 books for their school. So if you love to read or write stories why not enter? You may never know you have a novelist in you until you give it a try! The closing date for entries is 7pm sharp on Thursday 23rd February 2017.

Life After Nunnery - Abigail McFarlane

WE caught up with previous Head Girl, Abigail McFarlane to find out what she is up to now.

What GCSEs did you take at Nunnery Wood?

In addition to the core subjects I chose German, geography and food technology. I also chose Government & Politics As Level as an enrichment.

What did you do after leaving Nunnery Wood?

I now attend Hereford Sixth Form College (HSFC) and am studying English Language, Geography and German as A Levels.

Was College a big step up?

In some respects College was a huge step up. Not only was it a new way of learning with new teaching styles and expectations but also new transport and a new city. Despite this, I really enjoy it and have done since day one. Although Sixth Forms are another academic approach to learning and so have many similarities with high school, attitudes and the atmosphere are very different at college and therefore suitable for young adults.

Did you feel prepared for college?

I'll admit that the first day was pretty terrifying but I was ready for the next step. I took comfort in the fact that all first years are in the same boat: not really knowing anyone or where anything is but soon enough you find you fit right in.

Did you make new friends?

Only one person from my year also goes to HSFC. Thankfully he's my best friend so I had one person to get the train with and sit with on the first day. One of the best things about HSFC is how large the catchment area is, I have made loads of friends form Abergavenny to Batternhall. Getting the train in the morning helps you to get to know other students but enrichment activities and college events also act as mixers so you can meet people outside of lessons. Having said this, talk to the people in your lessons! (Within reason of course!) Chances are, if you've picked the same subject, you have similar interests and may share other lessons.

Is geography difficult in a different city?

Although geography was a struggle at first with 'local environment' meaning the new link road and the Brecon Beacons (no London Road or County Hall in sight), it was easy to quickly adapt and I have thoroughly enjoyed the subject so far, particularly the unit of globalisation.

Is taking a language hard?

All A Levels are extremely difficult and many people struggle with different aspects of the course. Taking a language is no different however it's really not as scary as some people think! HSFC has a wide range of facilities including an audio lab and conversations with a native speaker as well as friendly teachers who are willing to help. German was challenging to start with but now I'm comfortable in my class and really enjoy it.

What opportunities has HSFC given you in particular?

There are a wide variety of enrichment options and I am part of the Student Representative Council (SRC) and Model United Nations (MUN) as well as attending some of the debates. The Higher Education (HE+) program run by the careers department has also been really interesting. During these enrichment activities I am able to meet new people, share my interests and gain personal skills which are attractive to universities.

Do you have any more advice?

College is amazing but make sure you pick the right college and courses for you. While it's tempting to go to your closest one or wherever your friends are going, it's definitely worth looking around and going to open days of colleges which aren't an obvious choice.

What will be your next steps?

Currently I am organising an event with another student to celebrate International Women's Day (IWD). HSFC have given us permission and guided us through the process but also given us the freedom to organise the event ourselves. I'm excited to say a parliamentary outreach officer will be talking to students about women in parliament and a representative from West Mercia Women's Aid will be discussing abusive relationships. Both talks will be focussed around the IWD theme of #BeBoldForChange and the event promises to be a success.

After college, I am looking to progress to a degree in geography with international development at university and I know I will get support from my teachers and the careers department to do this.

Nunnery Wood Visit EnviroSort Recycling Plant

KEEN Eco Club members visited EnviroSort recycling plant in Norton, just 5 minutes from school. The site is the destination for all the recycling collected from doorsteps across Herefordshire and Worcestershire through weekly green bin collections. The students are part of the schools Eco-Rep programme and as such collect recycling at school everyday, but this trip allowed them to see where the material is taken to, how it is separated out and where it goes afterwards. The students enjoyed being shown how technology was used to sift through the hundreds of tonnes of waste that arrives at the plant, from huge magnets to extract steel cans to computers that measure the amount of light reflected off plastics to identify their properties and instantly separate them through fast pulses

of air. In addition to being given a guided tour the students learned how recycled paper is made and had a go at making some of their own. Mr Nightingale, who organised the trip said that, "The trip was enjoyed by all and the students left inspired to reduce their waste and recycle even more at home and at school".





Holocaust Memorial Day - How Can Life Go On?

HOLOCAUST Memorial Day on 27th January provided an opportunity for students to explore issues relating the Holocaust and examples of genocides including Armenia, Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. The theme of Holocaust Memorial Day this year was "How can life go on? " In history lessons all Key Stage Three students investigated the Holocaust and Genocide.

Students were also able to watch a live web cast of a Holocaust survivor speaking about her experiences of being in Auschwitz Concentration Camp. This was an emotional experience and left a lasting impression on students and teachers.

In addition to lessons taught by the history department, Professor Darius Jackson from University College London delivered lessons to Year 8 and Year 10 students. Firstly, Year 10 students examined the economics of the Holocaust and then Year 8 students investigated Anne Frank. Professor Jackson explained the content and aims of the Anne Frank lesson by telling us that, "All too often Anne Frank is used as an icon, she becomes a symbol. She is used to show "the triumph of hope over evil", even though she was killed during the Holocaust, dying from the horrific conditions in Bergen-Belsen. Sometimes she is quoted utterly out of context to provide uplifting sentiments, or short phrases with redemptive messages.

What this lesson sets out to do is to show that Anne Frank was a real teenage girl in a real historical context, and if we are to understand her brilliance we need to look beyond the simplistic clichés that are associated with her. We should



look at the life of this girl whose family left Germany as a refugees, to live in Amsterdam; who worked hard at being Dutch, addressing her diary to Kitty, a character from a famous Dutch children's novel. We need to see the importance of her father Otto, he planned their move from Frankfurt to Amsterdam then later the preparations for their hiding place on Prinsengracht . This lesson explores the events of Anne's life as well as the events in Nazi Germany and in the occupied Netherlands to show the real world Anne lived in."

In addition to activities in school, Head boy, Josh Cockeram and head girl, Ella Sutton attended the Multi Faith Commemoration held at County Hall. They both did a reading and were



interviewed by BBC Midlands Today, which was televised later that day. The event was well attended by schools from across the city, representatives of religious and community groups, as well as MP for Worcester, Robin Walker.

Miss Speechley said that, "It is vitally important that we ensure our students have an understanding of genocides that have taken place throughout history and continue to happen, which is why we have placed a big emphasis on Holocaust Memorial Day. It is important that misconceptions are challenged and that students are able to explore these issues fully. It is also an opportunity for us to promote British Values that include acceptance, tolerance, democracy and justice".

I am glad that you survived the war and eventually came to England. I hope you have been able to find happiness in your life. Your story is very important as it makes sure that we do not forget what







The inauguration was estimated to have about 160,000 attendeesnot the most inspiring turnout when compared to the vigour and passion that many people displayed on the Women's Marches.

Since then, Trump has been busy! Barack Obama had barely handed over the reigns before Trump officially decided to review policies that the ex- President had previously worked for. There were immediate changes to the White House website where Barack Obama's administration's information on civil rights, climate change, LGBT rights, healthcare, immigration, education and the "Iran Deal" all vanished. It changed to just six "issues" with, for example, "America first energy plan" replacing climate change. The new President has been enthusiastically devoting himself to his work as the most powerful man in the United States, if not the world, and has set to work trying to implement some of his most valued and important beliefs and promises. First on his very long to do list was to build a neat little wall between the US and Mexico. By day 6 of his presidency, he faced a fresh torrent of criticism as he moved ahead with the plans and by the next day, Mexican president Enrique Peña Nieto cancelled a visit to Washington, over Donald Trump's insistence that Mexico will pay for his border wall. By the afternoon, Trump's press secretary said the president had decided to hit Mexico with a

20% import tax. President Trump demonstrated that he wasn't joking during his campaign and acted on a lot of his rather shocking policies;

By day 4 of his presidency, Donald Trump began his effort to dismantle Barack Obama's legacy, formally scrapping a flagship trade deal with 11 countries in the Pacific rim. The new president also signed executive orders to ban funding for international groups that provide abortions.

Then came his most outrageous and controversial act yet and only a mere 8 days into his 4year term; Trump issued an executive order that will deny refugees and immigrants from certain Muslim-majority countries entry to the United States. Trump's unprecedented action will indefinitely close US borders to refugees fleeing the humanitarian crisis in war-torn Syria and impose a on Muslims travelling to the US from parts of the Middle East and North Africa.



The justice department then urged a federal court to reinstate Donald Trump's controversial travel ban, insisting that national security is at stake. Whether this is true, or if they just want to make sure Donald doesn't throw a tantrum, no one will ever truly know.

Parents enjoyed an exciting, energetic dance to Olly Murs "Dance with Me", as well as some beautifully played solos and duets on a range of instruments.




















Love cooking? Year 7's Latest Food Project


YEAR 7 students rose to the challenge with their recent pizza toast assessment.

They were assigned to design a pizza toast of their choice, infusing both creative designs with theoretical learning.

Practical skills focussed on 'bridge and claw' chopping techniques, grating and grilling. On the theoretical side, students were asked to focus on nutritional content of their ingredients and how they could increase the nutritional value of their product as well as making it look appealing and fun to eat.

The assessment took place close to Halloween, so many designs were inspired by this theme. Hence the ghostly figures and severed fingers as pictured here.





Super-food Protein Loaf



"For all you morning gym-goers this healthy protein bread is a great portable breakfast that will help with muscle repair and growth."

Ingredients

1 x 7g sachet of dried yeast
4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
250g gram flour
100g ground almonds
50g linseeds
100g mixed seeds, such as chia, poppy, sunflower, sesame, pumpkin
1 sprig of fresh rosemary
4 brase fore processor

4 large free-range eggs 3 teaspoons Marmite , optional

Method

Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/gas 5. Line a 1.5-litre loaf tin with greaseproof paper. Fill a jug with 375ml of lukewarm water, add the yeast and oil, then mix with a fork until combined and leave aside for 5 minutes.

Pile the flour, ground almonds and all the seeds into a large bowl with a pinch of sea salt and make a well in the middle. Pick, finely chop and add the rosemary leaves. Crack in the eggs, add the Marmite (if using – simply leave it out for a gluten-free friendly loaf) and beat together, then pour in the yeast mixture. Whisking as you go, gradually bring in the flour from the outside until combined – it'll be more like a batter than a dough. Pour into the prepared tin and smooth out nice and evenly on top.

Now you've got two choices – bake it straight away and it'll puff up a bit more and taste fantastic, or cover and place it in the fridge overnight and allow some slightly more complex sour flavours to develop. Both are brilliant, just different. To bake, place in the middle of the oven for 45 minutes, or until golden, cooked through and an inserted skewer comes out clean. Transfer to a wire rack to cool for at least 20 minutes before eating, then serve.

This bread is good fresh for a couple of days, and delicious toasted for a few days after that. You could even use any leftovers to make croutons.

These suggestions are all about giving you loads of colourful inspiration for tasty topping combos that'll fill you with goodness – choose your favourites and tuck in:

1. Chopped hard-boiled free-range egg, yoghurt, paprika & cress

3. Skinny cream cheese, ripe cherry tomatoes & fresh basil

4. Cottage cheese, soft-boiled free-range egg, paprika & spring onions

8. Skinny cream cheese, cherries & cinnamon

St John Ambulance First Aid Course

FOR three consecutive weeks in January, Year 10 Health and Social Care enrichment students have experienced a practical First Aid course which has taken 6 hours to complete.

First Aid knowledge gives young people the confidence to 'do something' rather than 'do nothing' if they find themselves in a situation. The St. John Ambulance trainer was keen for Nunnery Wood students to "Be the difference between a life lost and a life saved" which is the organisation's current slogan to promote their main focus.

Students have learned the importance of making sure that they, as first aiders, are 'safe' before attempting to take any other action of helping casualties involved in an emergency situation. It's about judging the scene, assessing what has occurred and prioritising those who need attention first.

Through their 'hands on' training students have learned how to put a casualty into the recovery position having first made sure their airway is open and that they are breathing. Students now understand the impact on the human body of 'shock' and how this can be avoided by taking appropriate action when a casualty has been hurt.

They have learned how to deal with clients who experience a heart attack or stroke, how to treat



burns and poisoning. Choking is thought to be one of the biggest killers of children as a result of swallowing small objects. Students learned when and how to administer 'back blows' in order to dislodge the blockage and if that doesn't work how to carry out abdominal thrusts. It's also important to know when to call for an ambulance, what information will be asked for by the emergency services or even whether an ambulance is necessary in certain situations.

In the third and final session, students learned how to carry out CPR safely and effectively. (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) Each student in turn, had to evidence their skill in this area by demonstrating on the on a training 'dummy'. They learned the importance of having a portable Defibrillator in all work places, including schools, which can save lives.

At the end of the six hour training, each student received a certificate to show they have taken part in the basic training as a Young First Aider. The qualification is valid for 3 years before a refresher course is recommended. In order to gain the qualification, students gave up 30 minutes of their lunchtime and 20 minutes after the end of the school day, to make up each two hour training session.





Imogen said, "I was very proud to join the squad, although a little nervous to begin with as we are the younger players in the mostly year 9 team. The older players made us feel really welcome."


Katie said, It's fun to be part of a squad facing different challenges in each match. We are learning from the older players."
